Happy Mothers' Day to All Our Mother Figures - A Reflection:

"... a good mother not only accompanies her children in their growth, without avoiding the problems and challenges of life; a good mother also helps them to make definitive decisions with freedom. This production is a great example of staff and students needing to be flexible, adaptable and developing a positive growth mindset around working with the disruptions caused by the building works.

New Timetables:

All students have received a new timetable this morning. This timetable reflects the final rooming for Term 2. The College has ensured that there will be no disruption to learning and teaching for Term 2. The spaces that are currently being used are spaces that will be in use for the remainder of Term 2. The new spaces (The College Chapel; The Thomas Aquinas Resource Centre (the library) and The Mary MacKillop Centre will be completed and certified by the end of this term. The movement into these areas will be tasked over the Term 2 holidays - so we do not have to disrupt the students and staff during their formal learning/teaching time.

NAPLAN (Years 7 & 9):

Last week all students in Years 7 and 9 were taken through the process of completing NAPLAN online through their iPads. Ms Prosser and Ms Watts reported their plans went to expectation and no issues were reported. The students have been given an opportunity to do a practise test for the upcoming NAPLAN Assessment this week. If you have any questions please contact your child's Leader of Year.

Year 8 Camp - Somerset Camp at Colo River:

This week (Tuesday - Friday) all of Year 8 and 13 staff head off for the Colo River. This is an "under canvas" camp - where the students conduct an extensive range of activities, mostly powered by their own steam. It is a camp in which they compete against themselves. It is certainly one of the most demanding camps - but a great deal of enjoyment and satisfaction

comes from the achievement of the various activities. It certainly supports one of the characteristics of education at St Leo's - the development of the whole person. Thank you to those staff who are providing the necessary supervision over those 4 days. They are giving up time away from their families and their normal classes.

The Election on Saturday - The major Parties Stand on Education -

Following is an <u>ABC News</u> summary of the major party policies on early learning and school education:

Early education

The Coalition is spending about \$450 million to give children access to 15 hours of preschool education a week until the end of 2020.

Labor has promised to commit permanent funding for preschool, replacing the current year-to-year funding arrangement, and extend it to three-year-olds from 2021.

The Opposition describes the plan as a major economic and social reform, however the Coalition has criticised the price tag (\$9.8 billion over 10 years) and says it is more important to improve four-year-olds' attendance rates first.

Schools

The "Gonski 2.0" funding arrangement announced by former Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull, replaced separate school funding deals in favour of a nationally consistent, needs-based system costing an extra \$23.5 billion over a decade.

Following concerns identified primarily by the Catholic education sector over the funding formula for non-government schools, a new model based on parents' income, rather than their postcode, was identified resulting in an extra \$4.5 billion over the next decade.

The Coalition's 2019 Budget also included a \$30 million fund for school equipment and

The Coalition's 2019 Budget also included a \$30 million fund for school equipment and upgrades.

Labor has pledged an extra \$14 billion for government schools over the next 10 years, \$3.3 billion of which would flow into education within the first three years — an amount it says could pay for thousands of extra teachers.

The Opposition will not reverse the \$4.5 billion funding for non-government schools. It has threatened to cap teaching degree places if universities do not do more to lift standards. Read about the major party policies for higher and vocational education via ABCNews

Australia Catholic Youth Festival Expressions of Interest due this Friday.


The Australian Catholic Youth Festival (ACYF) is a national gathering that aims to provide young people with opportunities to deepen their relationship with Jesus, be empowered to be disciples in the world today and encounter and celebrate the vitality of the Church in Australia. This year St Leo's aims to take a group of 40 students to ACYF in Perth from Sat 7 to Wed 12 December (Term 4, Week 9). There will be two tourist days for exploring Perth as well as the four days of the Youth Festival. The total cost of the 6 days in Perth will be about \$1,880. This will cover: airfare, accomodation, breakfasts, coach transfers, registration, festival meals. However, Broken Bay Diocese has agreed to subsidise a third of the cost and St Leo's will subsidise another third. This means that St Leo's students will only have to pay \$650. (Note: Year 10 students have the option of attending ACYF instead of their Year 10 Urban Challenge which will reduce further the amount to pay.) If you are supportive of your child attending, please complete and return the attached Expression of Interest Form. There will be a selection process, particularly if there are more applicants than places available. We will be taking students from Years 9 - 12.




Year 11 - Retreat Notes

NSW Parliament - College Captains' visit

Please see report below from **Luke Birrell** (12) regarding the College Captains' visit to NSW Parliament last Wednesday. It was a very worthwhile experience which included a 'working' lunch with local member, Matt Kean.

On the 8th May, the four captains from STLCC, I included, went to Martin Place to attend a meeting with many of the other schools across NSW. The day started off with a discussion with local MP's, talking with all the schools in the auditorium. We then moved off to watch the Low and High courts, discuss issues and topics of the day. As it was only the second day of the new term, everything seemed quite lively in the chambers. It was interesting to see such esteemed politicians acting like school children and making snarky comments whenever climate change and plastic bags were raised. After this, we moved back into the auditorium, where the MP's answered a few more questions. From there, all the schools in the Hornsby district were called in to lunch with Matt Kean (local MP). Uniform

Students are now expected be attired in full Winter uniform including blazer. Other garments (such as hoodies) that are worn to the College will be confiscated. If students have an issue with uniform/grooming on a particular day, they should see their Year Leader before 8:30am and obtain a Uniform Pass. All students are expected to wear the blazer to and from the College every day during Terms 2-3. Year 12 may continue wearing their College jersey. Please see the Student Diary if any uniform/grooming expectations need clarification.

Student Leave Forms

Where necessary circumstances require student leave from the College, parent/caregivers are required in the first instance to make a formal written application to the Principal for exemption from attendance. If the student leave is approved, which is not automatic, respective students have permission to negotiate the completion of any applicable assessment task(s) with both their subject teacher and respective KLA Leader, should the task(s) fall due within the leave period. Depending on their submitted leave request, students are required to make contact with ALL teachers via the relevant College application form and ensure that the classwork and assessment sections are fully completed. It is important to note that the College does not support families taking extended holidays during term time and/or during College examination periods.

Attendance

For whole day absences please use the College Skoolbag app but for partial absences (early departure) a note from the parent/caregiver is required to be presented to your child's Year Leader before school. Following an absence from the College you must ensure that within seven (7) days you provide the College a verbal or written explanation for the absence. If students arrive late to the College parent/caregivers must notify the College as soon as possible via the Skoolbag app, telephone call or signed parent/caregiver entry in their child's diary outlining the reason for the lateness.
