


Parent Survey Results

Earlier this week I received the results of the survey the Catholic Schools Office sent out about a month ago to all parents and caregivers. There were 209 respondents and below is a snapshot of the results:


Q1 I have been supported by my school during the COVID 19 CRISIS




Q3 I am confident with my school's processes for a safe return to face to face learning





Q2 My School was responsive to my child's home based learning needs

Then finally, responses to the question – 'How likely is that you would recommend your child's school to a friend or colleague' (a scale of 0-10)

0-6 – 12 % of respondents

7-8 – 31% of respondents

9-10 - 57% of respondents

Following this question there were a large number of comments detailing why respondents gave the rating they did. The College is currently working through these 141 items and will extract the main themes and incorporate them into our planning where applicable.



Q&A Zoom Session Evening with Careers Specialist Kathryn Taylor for Y10 Parents - Tonight

This evening (Wednesday June 17 at 7.00pm)the College will be hosting a Q&A Zoom Session Evening with Kathryn Taylor. Kathryn is the Director of Turning Point Consulting and is a career aptitude specialist. This evening will enable parents to speak directly with Kathryn and to ask questions that relate directly with your daughter or son. Kathryn will be speaking around the following topics:

- My child doesn't want to speak about careers. How do I start the discussion?
- Is University really going to give my child the best career choice in the future?
- What is the best path after school to guarantee employment?

Focusing on Academic Excellence - PEP (Passion into Excellence Program) Update

In order to support Year 12 achieve their potential during a very difficult start to the year, the College has instituted the Passion into Excellence Program. The PEP is designed to drill down into the specific performance of every student across all courses, and provide strategies and support that accurately target the areas that will provide the highest yield of learning gain from course to course, exam to exam and question to question.

The strategies employed thus far are:

- Result targets have been set for each course and have been informed by data analysis
- Data walls that identify the present performance of each student in each course have been installed.
 These data cards identify whether each topic and each skill required is a strength or weakness. Strategies for each student are then prepared accordingly to move their placement on the data wall towards a higher band result



- HSC Master class / Holiday Workshop Program has been developed to target the 'application' of their knowledge to HSC questions
- Major Work 'Check In' Interviews with the Leader of Learning, the student, parents and a member of the Catholic Schools Office are being scheduled as a progress and quality check
- Post Trial Program PTP: The College will be restructuring the post trial period to be a tailored
 program of daily workshops that expose students to a College specialist in the course, followed by
 the re-completion of the trial exam. These workshops during the PTP are compulsory. This will
 enable students to apply the feedback from the teachers in the trial exam and thus refine their skills
 and application of content
- PEP Talks: Each member of the College Leadership team have been allocated a focus group of Year 12 mentees to academically mentor on a regular basis. This is in addition to the support of their traditional daily Mentor.

Such initiatives are the product of the ongoing strategic priority by the College to maximise the learning gain of every student and thus increase HSC result yields. This focus will have College-wide impacts that will be discussed in due course for Year 7-11.

Feast of Corpus Christi - Bread of Life

Last Sunday we celebrated the *Feast of Corpus Christi - the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ*. It is one moment in our liturgical year when we spend particular time and energy venerating the Body and Blood of Jesus.

As Bishop Anthony Randazzo tells us; "the Eucharist is an experience of personal, spiritual fellowship with Christ... and that He is food for our journey and forgiveness for our sins". In addition, Pope Francis



recently spoke of Jesus as the living bread that can satisfy our deepest yearnings. "Besides physical hunger, people have another hunger, one that cannot be satisfied with ordinary food. It is the hunger for life, hunger for love (and) hunger for eternity," he said.

Therefore, we invite you to share 'communion' at home with your family so as to nourish your hunger for life, hunger for love, and hunger for eternity in Christ.

A suggested activity that the family can participate in is:

Pray

Around the meal table, say together a prayer of thanksgiving ('grace') as a sign of your unity as a family, and as the body of Christ. Pray for those who hunger for food, for love, for family.

Celebrate

Invite family and guests to share memories of their First Communion Day (or other spiritually-significant event). (Adapt the question so that all can join in.)

Preparation for Baptism, Confirmation and First Holy Communion @ St Leo's

St Leo's Catholic College would like to offer any students who have not completed their Sacraments of Initiation the possibility of being prepared through the College. Some parents may have left the decision of baptism to their children, and high school would be a good age to have the conversation with them whether they would like to become part of the Catholic community. Other students may have for various reasons missed out on the sacraments of Confirmation or Eucharist when their peers received them in primary school. High school students may feel awkward attending sacramental preparation classes with primary school students. Student Leadership 2020/2021

The student leadership process has now begun for our new 2020/2021 leaders. Interested Year 11 candidates have submitted their applications and both student and staff voting will be held this week. Short-listed candidates will be interviewed next week once applications are viewed by the selection panel and voting tallies are collated. A total of **34** student leadership positions are available and include College Captain (x2), College Vice-Captain (x2), Student Representative Council (x2), Growth Domain ambassadors - Spiritual, Physical, Academic, Cultural, Environmental & Social Emotional (x12) and House Ambassadors (x16).

Signing in/out via the Compass Student Kiosk - Now Compulsory

Please discuss with your son/daughter (as required):

- Unfortunately a significant number of Senior students are failing to correctly sign-out from the College via the Compass Student Kiosk when they have a Period 5 study (Senior Study) or have TAFE or no scheduled Period 5 on their timetables (flexible timetable). Consequently, students will be marked as UNEXPLAINED, which significantly impacts on their overall College attendance record. The College has an important Duty of Care requirement and ALL 7-12 students are now expected to use the kiosk when signing out. Students who continually disregard this compulsory expectation may face additional consequences.
- All late arrivals to the College will be recorded as UNEXPLAINED except when a signed hard-copy
 note is provided by the student and/or respective parent/caregivers. Use the Add Attendance Note
 feature on the Compass Parent Portal to enter a reason(s). Again, failure to provide a legitimate
 reason(s) via a note and/or parent Compass entry, for ongoing late arrivals, will significantly impact
 on a student's overall attendance record and may require a parent/caregiver interview.
- All students are expected to attend all scheduled Period 1-5 classes failure to attend a scheduled class is truanting except if a valid reason is provided. Students who truant lessons (including Period 5) will be required to make-up this time on Wednesday afternoon (3.15-4.45pm) via a Reflective Growth Intervention or RGI.

Intake 2020 Social Media Presentation

Last Wednesday, June 10, Senior Sergeant Lynda Hart, Police Youth Liaison Officer from Hornsby Police Unit spoke to all of Intake 2020 about the risks around using social media. Below is a summary of what was spoken about. The message was made very clear that social media can be a scary world and it needs to be used with caution.

- Anything is that is uploaded onto social media is there forever, regardless if it is deleted or not
- There is no such thing as being anonymous online. Every account can be traced if required
- It is illegal to pose as someone online that you are not.
- · Bullying and harassment online is a criminal offence
- Senior Sergeant recommended that all students deleted any apps that had people acting 'anonymously' on them as they are public forums and open to many different potential areas of concern.
- A good rule to remember 'if you would not say it to or show it to your grandparents, do not post it'.

Please have a conversation with your son/daughter about what was presented at the talk as it is really important that parents are aware of their young person's involvement with social media and that the dialogue around the safety of using these platforms is open.

If you are ever concerned about content that your son/daughter has received on social media platforms, please do not hesitate to contact the police. Behaviour on social media is something that authorities take very seriously, and everyone needs to be aware of the potential repercussions of particular behaviours on these platforms.
