NAPLAN Last Week

Well done to our young people in Intake 2021 and Year 9 who sat their NAPLAN Assessments last week.

As you would have seen from the media, there were a few glitches due to the instability of the platform so that we made the decision to delay the final NAPLAN Test for Year 9 until the following day. This was unfortunate, but out of our control. The online platform provided by ACARA (Australian Curriculum and

Reporting Authority) glitched across a large number of schools. Obviously as more and more schools move to NAPLAN online assessment across the nation, there may be a few technical issues. All states/territories have agreed that by 2022, all schools will take this assessment online.

One of the main advantages of having the online NAPLAN Assessment is that students sit a *tailored (or adaptive test)* that adapts to their individual responses, presenting students with questions that may be more or less difficult, resulting in better assessment and more precise results.

We now look forward to seeing the results.

Some Interesting Reading

A few weeks ago I purchased this book (right) about the 'Alpha Generation' by Mark McCrindle and Ashley Fell. Mark is a social researcher and analyst for 30 years. It states these children, born between **2010 and 2024**, are our most globally connected generation ever.

From his research, what lies ahead of us (if not here already)?

- Gen Alpha are the most materially endowed generation ever, the most technologically savvy generation ever, and they will enjoy a longer life span than any previous generation of Australians.
- They will stay in education longer, start their earning years later and so stay at home with their parents later than even their predecessors, Gen Z and Gen Y.
- The role of parents therefore will span a longer age range- with many of these Gen Alphas likely to be still living at home into their late 20s.
- This newest generation are part of an unintentional global experiment where screens are placed in front of them from the youngest age as pacifiers, entertainers and educational aids. This great screen age in which we are all living has bigger impacts on the generation exposed to such screen saturation during their formative years.
- From shorter attention spans to the gamification of education, from increased digital literacy to impaired social formation, these times impact us all but transform those in their formative years.
- Generation Alpha began being born in 2010, the year the iPad was launched, Instagram was created, and App was the word of the yearand so from their earliest years, they have been screenagers.
- They are a generation in Australia that comprises more than 1 in 7 residents, yet few people have

heard of them. Within 4 years, they will outnumber the Baby Boomers, and many of them will live to see the 22nd Century.

- There are 3 million of them in Australia and more than 2.5 million are born globally every week. When they have all been born (2025) they will number almost 2 billion- the largest generation in the history of the world.
- While they are the youngest generation, they have brand influence and purchasing power beyond their years.
- They shape the social media landscape, are the popular culture influencers, the emerging consumers and by the end of the 2020s will be moving into adulthood, the workforce and household formation, ready or not.

Well worth a read. What implications for bringing up/teaching/education of these young people?

Athletics Carnival Tomorrow – Final Reminders

- A chartered shuttle service will operate from Mt Kuring-gai railway station to Foxglove Oval in the morning, and from Foxglove to Mt Kuring-gai station in the afternoon. Mr Petrie will supervise the students boarding and disembarking the buses.
- Parents are more than welcome to attend. Please register for Covid-19 tracing using the QR code at the registration table/marquee. Bring a picnic blanket or chair and enjoy the BBQ and canteen available, however we request that you set up camp along the outside of the oval rather than in the middle or near the competition areas to avoid safety and traffic flow issues.
- The Carnival will officially start at 8.30am and finish at approximately 2:00pm. Students will be required to assemble at Foxglove Oval in Mentor Group lines **no later than 8.15am** for roll marking. Another roll will be taken at the conclusion of the event. Students who have registered to compete in the **800m event** will need to be at Foxglove Oval by **8am**.
- Students who are absent due to illness on the day will **require a doctor's certificate** or other documentation to be returned to their Year Leader upon their return to school. If your child is absent on the day, please contact the College between 8.15am and 9.00am. If students do not arrive at the oval, the College will contact parents throughout the morning. If your child is unable to participate in events, he/she is still expected to attend and I would ask that you provide a note explaining the condition that prevents direct participation.
- Students in Year 11 who no longer possess a sport uniform are permitted to wear appropriate active wear in their house colours.
- Students from Intake 2021 to Year 11 are expected to wear full sports uniform. In keeping with tradition, Year 12 are permitted to wear fancy dress to support their house. Fancy dress MUST only be worn at the venue and casual house colour clothing can be worn to and from the venue. This should be tasteful and non-offensive. Students who are in doubt about whether their clothing would be considered appropriate by the College should check with their Year Leader.

Morrisby Career Profiling for Year 10

As part of the Year 11 subject selection process for your young person, all Year 10 students have undertaken the *Morrisby Career Profiling* today. The aim of completing this profiling was to ensure that students were well equipped with relevant and useful information to aide them with their subject selection decision-making commencing next Friday 28th May.

Morrisby Career Profiling is a world-renowned educational planning tool that has been developed by the Morrisby Group in the United Kingdom. Modified for the Australian market, Morrisby Career Profiling provides students and their parents/carers with a tool that helps the individual to develop the most appropriate pathway for the themselves during Stage 6 and into a life post-secondary school.

Students completed a number of aptitude tests that ranged from *verbal, numerical, abstract, spatial* and *mechanical*. Following this, they then completed two additional questionnaires that focused on *career interests* and *personality types*. Students and parents/carers will shortly have access to a highly detailed report that provides information on things such as: *an individual's strengths, their learning styles, area of career interests, working styles, personality type,* and *suggested subjects to selected for Stage* 6. This report can be accessed via the student's own Morrisby account that they have set up **from 4pm today.** (Wednesday).

Edmund Rice Camps

Year 11 2022 Subject Selections

With the conclusion of Year 10 quickly approaching, the students of Year 10 will now be turning their attention to choosing subjects for the two years of their HSC studies. The College has a range of mechanisms to support students and their families to make informed decisions about the subjects that they wish to study.

The timeline for the subject selection process will be:

- Mid Week 6 Information released to parents and students via the school website. •
- Friday Week 6 - Year 10 to participate in a subject talk and Q&A session with KLA Leaders to inform them about the subjects on offer.
- Monday Week 7 A Zoom meeting for parents and students will be held on May 31 at 7pm. This will • be an opportunity for parents to find out more information and ask some questions.
- Tuesday Week 7 Online subject selection link will go live and students can make their subject • selections.
- Weeks 9/10 Year 10 students will meet with a staff member to review their subject choices and to ensure that students are meeting the requirements to obtain a HSC and an ATAR (if they choose).

Updated Student Pastoral Time-Out Procedure

The College has updated the Student Pastoral Time-out procedure to ensure that students who genuinely need this level of intervention have access to it. Time-out is usually one of our last intervention strategies after we have tried other resilience-building and distress-tolerance strategies. The time-out process is

managed by each year group's Year Leader, the College Counsellor and the Director of Pastoral Care and Well-being, and is reviewed regularly.

Time-out is a short-term intervention strategy recommended by clinicians or therapists, such as GP's or psychologists, to help a student manage severe anxiety or trauma and is often included in the student's mental health and safety management plan. The time-out card will include an expiry date and a review will be held with the students Year Leader, treating specialist and parent, if an extension to that date is required.

The general criteria (but not limited to) for time-out are:

- 1. The student has officially been diagnosed with an anxiety disorder by a professional clinician or therapist; or
- 2. The student is suffering from a significant mental health disorder or trauma that requires this type of deescalating strategy; or
- 3. The student has been granted this intervention strategy at the discretion of their Year Leader or Leadership Team Member.
