Dear Parents, Carers and Friends of the College,

On Wednesday this week we held our *Student Leadership Induction* ceremony where we formally commissioned our new Year 12 Leaders for 2022. Each Leader was presented with a stole and leadership badge by a member of the College Leadership Team. The stole is an ancient symbol of authority dating back to the officials of the Roman Empire. It designates a person as having a leadership role and responsibility in the community. Our new leaders are called to be courageous leaders and be guided by the question *"Have I made St Leo's a better place today?"* 

Saint Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa) is a model for courageous leadership. At the ceremony I shared the 'Paradoxical Commandments' that were found written on the wall of Mother Teresa's Home for Children in Calcutta:



People are often unreasonable, irrational, and self-centred. Forgive them anyway. If you are kind, people may accuse you of selfish, ulterior motives. Be kind anyway If you are successful, you will win some unfaithful friends and some genuine enemies. Succeed anyway. If you are honest and sincere people may deceive you. Be honest and sincere anyway. What you spend years creating, others could destroy overnight. Create anyway. If you find serenity and happiness, some may be jealous. Be happy anyway. The good you do today, will often be forgotten. Do good anyway. Give the best you have, and it will never be enough. Give your best anyway. In the final analysis, it is between you and God.



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Although not all students in the Year 12 hold formal leadership positions, we see all students in Year 12 as leaders within the College. We call all students in the Class of 2022 to take up the mantle of leadership and be examples for the rest of the College community of how to live the values of integrity, hope, dignity and respect, and justice.

# **Return to Campus Safety Plan - Update**

The College is currently reviewing the updated guidelines and advice from Catholic Schools NSW, Catholic Schools Broken Bay and NSW Health to determine what parts of our Safety Plan need to be adjusted. Once we have a revised plan, we will publish it to our community. However, a reminder of the following provisions that must be followed:

- Students are required to wear face coverings when indoors and it is recommended outdoors (but not mandatory).
- Students are required to be in their respective Year Group Zone at the start of the day, at recess, and at lunchtime in order to reduce the mixing of cohorts.
- Students are required to wear face coverings when on public transport.
- Students are required to line-up in outdoor assembly areas if they have class in Bakhita House, Teresa House or Mary MacKillop Centre.
- We encourage students to continue to use hand sanitiser which is available at sanitisation stations around the campus.
- There will be staggered dismissal times at the end of the day to assist with minimising students of different Year Groups mingling. Students in Year 7 - Year 9 will be dismissed at 2.50pm and Year 10 – Year 12 at 3.00pm.

# Feeding the Homeless in Hornsby

Each Term a group of St Leo's students prepares food and serves it to those experiencing poverty at St John's Dish in Jersey Street, Hornsby. This week, 12 Year 10 students from the new Vinnies School Conference stayed back after school to prepare 40 hot meals in our St Leo's kitchens under the expert guidance of Mrs Bourke. They prepared lasagne, butter chicken, frittata and pesto pasta as well as salads to be distributed.

**Will, Zinta, Tony** and **Charbel** were then accompanied to the Dish by Madam Noel and Rev Gomez to serve the meals to locals down on their luck. Normally patrons of the Dish sit at tables in the backyard to



be served, giving them time to socialise. However, with current restrictions, the students had to serve the hot food and drinks through a window to take away. Here are some student reflections on their experience:

"I am extremely grateful that I had the opportunity to help hand out food to the less fortunate people in our community. I met so many people who all have their own authentic and unique stories. It also meant a lot to see how happy the people were after receiving the food and seeing how grateful they were." - *Charbel* 



"Getting a glimpse into the lives of those in our community less fortunate than us has made me even more grateful for the privileges I am so lucky to have, and I was glad to be able to help these people and put my faith into action. Seeing the gratitude expressed for the meals provided, and the connections formed reiterated for me the significance of "The Dish" to these people, and the importance of the countless volunteers who ensure this wonderful initiative continues to run. It was definitely a special experience which has made me enthusiastic to volunteer at similar initiatives." - *Zinta* 

"Running the Dish was something that I was at first a little unsure about, I had heard stories from students that had gone previously although I really had no idea what to expect. Once we started cooking up the food and got moving however, it was such an overall amazing and rewarding experience, and it was nice to know we were actually making a difference in the lives of others.
