Students Crossing at Yardley Ave and Pacific Highway

Last Friday afternoon, a secondary student from another local school was struck by a car at the intersection of Yardley Ave and the Pacific Highway. The student is recovering in hospital. It will be a journey for him, but with prayers and support, he will thankfully come through.

I reminded all students at our weekly assembly last Monday that they should always cross at the lights - and with the lights. They should always check the traffic before walking across the crossing. In the afternoon there can be up to 400 students using this crossing in a very short period. Cars travelling north look straight into the setting sun. It is very hazardous, and students need to be aware of the potential dangers. Each afternoon, a senior member of the St Leo's staff is on duty at the crossing from 3pm until about 3.20pm (whenever the last students use the crossing).

This week I was on duty twice at this location. I took a couple of photos to show how busy this crossing can be over a very short period of time.

I would ask parents/carers to reinforce this message to their young people.

Performing at your Peak

Over the past two weekly assemblies, I spoke to the students about reflecting on their Semester 1 Reports and setting linked goals for the second semester. The goals are the easy part - what is more difficult is the action steps needed to get there! Students (and all of us) need to recalibrate.

To reflect on one's performance is a good thing. It encourages change in oneself: change in direction, change in behaviours and therefore the possibility of change in outcomes. But sometimes working out how to create change in yourself is the difficult part and that is where recalibration comes in. To recalibrate is to make small changes to an instrument so that it measures accurately. It is also to re-examine one's thinking, system of values, and to correct it in accord with a new understanding or purpose. So, if recalibration is about making small adjustments to the instrument and the instrument is you, then what are some good examples that will bring about the desired change?

Exercise – affects your mood and improves your body's performance both physically, emotionally, and mentally. Top academics ensure they exercise regularly.

Diet – what you put into the instrument, your body, affects performance and how it operates. It is the same with hydration, most headaches are fixed with more water consumption.



Sleep – the Coach of the Seattle Seahawks, Pete Carroll talks about sleep as his greatest weapon in delivering results as a coach. When his players get adequate sleep, they play better. I am sure he adds something else into his coaching matrix, but he rates sleep as the key performance indicator.

Repetition/Habits – a favourite author of mine, Malcolm Gladwell states that it takes 10,000 hours of intensive practice to achieve mastery of complex skills – good behaviour in class every day, revision each night, 10 minutes of reading every day, and writing out your notes are proven ways to improve your learning. Make this one of your SMART goals for this term.


Technology – humans were not designed to be connected to technology all day and night. (one of the reasons we developed the recent *College Mobile Device policy*) It takes an hour for your eyes and brain to unwind properly from looking at a screen. I encourage you to get your technology usage under control for better overall wellbeing and to find other ways to relax – go for a walk, play with your dog, cook a meal, or help someone out.


Praisefest is a voluntary activity, and is recommended for students Year 9 and up, although younger students who are

REMINDERS:

Student leave requirements & Compass Parent Portal

All student leave requests, in the first instance, should be communicated **in writing to the Principal** (Mr Gleeson) - an email to the College is acceptable. Students requesting leave should then **see Mr Johansen** (Director of Students) in Xavier Court to obtain the appropriate paperwork.

There are two forms – *Exemption from Attendance* (under 10 days) or *Application for Extended Leave* (over 10 days). All completed leave forms should be returned to the Director of Students, Xavier Court office as soon as possible for processing. It is important to note that leave beyond 10 days must be first considered by Catholic Schools Broken Bay (CSBB) via the College.

The Compass Parent Portal should <u>not</u> be used for any student leave requests and/or communication of student matters. Parents/carers are reminded to make contact (email/phone), in the first instance, with their son/daughter's Year Leader to discuss any concerns or issues.

**Please note that the College does not support families taking extended holidays during term time and/or during College examination periods as it impacts on student learning.

Religious Creative Arts Competition for Art, Music, Dance, Drama or Film!

The **Bishop's Art Prize** competition is a well-established event at Catholic Schools Broken Bay that has been running for the past nine years. In 2022, the art prize competition has been re-imagined. Open to all CSBB school students from Kindergarten **to Year 10**, it is now called the 'Religious Creative Arts Competition', and includes five categories: Visual Arts, Dance, Drama, Music, or Short Film.

One of the key elements of the competition is how students demonstrate their understanding of and connection to the theme. In 2022 the theme is one of CSBB's core values, **COURAGE** - 'Be strong and courageous..., for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go' (Joshua 1:9) – which of course is also our St Leo's theme this year.


Students are required to link their creative piece directly to the religious theme of **courage** by answering the question: 'How is this theme lived out or demonstrated today?' Thus, as well as creating an artwork, short film, dance, drama or music piece, students need to write a short explanation of their work (*maximum word count 150 words*) to outline how it connects to the theme of courage.

Artworks are to be handed in to schools by Week 5 of Term 3 – Monday, August 15.

Local judging will take place followed by a selection of finalists. These finalists will then be featured at the **CSBB Showcase Night** to be held at the Light of Christ Centre on 18 October.
