During the recent holidays the Evaluation Team met to discern a great deal of data, consisting of:


- Catholic Schools NSW comparative statistical data

- Student attendance
- Tell Them From Me Survey
- And the internal school survey conducted at the end of last term

In the past three weeks, the panel has also conducted interviews with parents/carers, staff, students as well as classroom visitations. Both the *Evaluation Team* and the *College Leadership Team* have conducted two workshops to triangulate this data and to discern the evidence of good work as well as areas for improvement. This is so we can ensure our students are being provided the best education possible and for the College to be at least as good as the very best. Once this discernment period is completed, the results and future direction will be provided for the community. Please don't hesitate to contact me if you have any queries or concerns.


The Term IV Parents in Partnership Evening will be next Wednesday, 9 November at 7pm (via Zoom). The draft agenda will be:

Student Leaders Attend Youth Mental Health Forum




The 2022 Hornsby Kuring-gai Mental Health


Thank you to all involved. It was wonderful to gather again in person, relaxing with

Pathways & Partnerships Update

The Pathways & Partnership Program seeks to link industry and education to create the real-world foundations that underpin teaching and learning. It also serves to equip our students with the necessary knowledge, understanding and skills to effectively plan their own career pathways.



Year 11 Student Leaders **Zinta H** and **Nicholas G** participated in the planning and delivery of an exciting CSBB Industry-Education workshop on '*Challenging Career Gender Stereotypes*' with Our Lady of the Rosary primary. They both gained a valuable insight into and experience of Educational Careers. Thank you to Regional Industry Educational Partnerships (RIEP) and the 10 industries who attended, for supporting this initiative. It was a great success with many Years 5 and 6 students believing that they really 'can become anything that they want to be'.

We are always keen for our students to hear first-hand about the range of post-school training, study, and

employment pathways available to them. Several organisations recently accepted our invitations to provide lunchtime careers presentations to all year groups.

TAFE unsurprisingly attracted a large audience, highlighting to students the \great range of post-school vocational pathways and training opportunities. The students asked many great questions in the Q&A session following the presentation, and both TAFE presenters stated that the breadth and depth of questioning from the students was the most impressive they have ever seen!





Wendy Raiston from *CatholicCare* also presented to the students on careers in areas such as social work, youth work, disability support, aged care, counselling, childcare and early

years teaching. Many of these careers are increasing in demand with very promising long-term prospects in the everchanging world of work.

The **Australian Defence Forces** presented a highly engaging presentation on career opportunities in a diverse range of areas, including the many support roles such as hospitality and logistics, which are often overlooked in the defence forces. Students engaged in a busy Q&A session at the end of the

presentation, asking questions that may influence their subject selection decisions in Years 10, 11 and 12, as well as giving others a strong direction and motivation to achieve career goals. We were delighted to see students

from Years 7 and 8 represented in the audience, having directly targeted these students with the simple message that "it is never too early to think about your career".

Systems Connect, who manage the Sydney Metro Project, were invited to present on employment and training opportunities as well as 2023 work experience opportunities in a range of career areas including building, engineering and construction. A range of boys and girls were represented as well as students across Years 7 to 12.

We partnered with several providers so far this year to engage our Year 9 Students who are studying Physical Activity and Sports

Studies (PASS) on careers related to sport. Sports Journalist and Commentator **Gordon Bray** Zoomed in from his Central Coast home into **Mr Wilson's** classroom to speak to the students on this exciting career area. He spoke on the pathways into a career in sports journalism and gave a very realistic insight into a day in the life of a sports journalist.

We also partnered with *Kidney Health Australia* to provide a wonderful opportunity for Year 12 Biology students to hear a first-hand account of the day in the life of a Renal Nurse.





Retired nurse **Linda Christy** Zoomed from South Australia into both Year 12 Classrooms to present on and discuss renal failure and kidney dialysis through a slide presentation.

Most students were audibly struck to hear that dialysis patients can spend up to 4 hours a day on a dialysis machine, 3 days a week! Linda went on to answer questions from students and highlight pathways into nursing and renal nursing. Connecting to



industry helps to consolidate learning in the classroom through the application of theory to real-word practices. Let's hope we inspired some future nurses! Thank you to **Ms Caiger** for enabling this connection to Industry.

Next week one of our maths teachers, **Mr Huo** will be taking part in a cross-sectoral educational initiative on 'Maths in Industry'. He will be working with the **Ministry of Health** to co-design an engaging maths lesson which links authentic industry practice to the maths curriculum. Industry will then co-deliver the lesson with Sunny with his class students later in Term 4. We look forward to hearing more about this initiative and we anticipate high student engagement with this venture.

The Mathematics KLA and I are also planning a 2023 initiative with **Sydney Flight College** to build the capacity of maths teachers to deliver curriculum-based real-world problem solving, as well as for students to engage in maths workshops at Bankstown Aerodrome. We hope that they will understand the importance of maths through seeing how it is used on a daily basis by those who work in the Aviation Industry.

We are always very grateful to our community partners for linking the real world to the teaching and learning that happens in the classroom. We are always kept busy planning many more exciting partnerships between our school and the wider community. How to Give Compass Permissions

The College is in the process of moving towards electronic permission forms for all events and excursions. It is essential that parents and carers access Compass regularly for notifications and ensure all permission are signed and up to date. A quick guide on how to grant permissions via the app is included below. Alternatively, please contact the College for any assistance or view the Compass Help Guides online if needed.

- 1. Events and Payments: You have event/s requiring action. Click to proceed.
- 2. Events: View and pay for events here. Click right arrow.
- 3. View the Event and click the right arrow.
- 4. Read Information regarding the event (Description, Date, Time Location, and Event Details). Scroll down to the bottom. Click Green Section: Proceed to Consent and Payment.
- 5. Add any further Medical Information. Add Contact Details on the day (if different).
- 6. Scroll to the bottom to provide consent type and add Parent/Guardian Full Name.
- 7. Click the green consent button.

Year 7 (plus Year 8 & 10 Catch-up) Vaccinations - Monday 7 November

NSW Health will be attending St Leo's next Monday, 7 November to offer the following vaccinations:

- Year 7 Human Papillomavirus vaccine (HPV) dose and Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis
- Year 8 Human Papillomavirus vaccine (HPV) dose (catch up)
- Year 10 Meningococcal ACWY vaccine (catch up)



Consent Forms

No student will receive vaccinations at school without a completed consent form signed by their parent/guardian. All students should already have returned their consent forms to their Mentor teachers earlier in the year.

Year 7 and 8 parents/guardians that completed and returned the consent form at the beginning of the year do not need to do another form for this vaccination.

Year 10 parents/guardians who have already returned a form to school but whose student was absent do not need to complete another form. If parents have not yet completed a form and would like the Meningococcal vaccine given at school, please contact the school for a Vaccination Consent pack.

A parent/guardian may change their mind (after submitting the signed form) and withdraw their consent for vaccination at any time. This can be done by providing the school with written notification of such withdrawal, or by emailing nslhd-phuschoolvaccinationprogram@health.nsw.gov.au

There is no concern for students receiving the HPV, dTpa or Meningococcal ACWY (school vaccinations) either before or after they complete COVID-19 vaccinations (advised by National Centre for Immunisation Research & Surveillance).

Parents should also:

- Ensure that students with influenza-like symptoms do not attend school and are tested as soon as possible (www.nsw.gov.au/covid-19/symptoms-and-testing)
- Ensure that their student eats breakfast on the morning of the vaccination clinic.

A Record of Vaccination card will be provided to each student. Details about vaccinations given at school will also be uploaded to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR). Further information about school vaccination is available: http://www.health.nsw.gov.au/schoolvaccination


Absent Students

Absent Year 7 students will be offered any missed vaccinations (HPV or dTpa) at the first school clinic in 2023 and do not need to go to their GP for the vaccine. Absent Year 10 students are advised to go to their GP.
