### **Choosing HSC Subjects – Changes from 2024**

Over the last few weeks, we have been working with Year 10 students to prepare them to make decisions about their pattern of study for their senior years at St Leo's. At the centre of the process is providing students with the information they need to make the best choices available to them. We are in a rapidly changing landscape for education and training that is giving young people more choices than ever before. We want our students to have access to these choices and not let old ways of thinking limit their options.

For students entering Year 11 in 2024, there are <u>changes to the</u> <u>types of courses that are eligible to be counted into the ATAR</u> <u>calculation</u>. Students can now include **any number of VET courses** (Vocational Education and Training) in their pattern of study and still be eligible for an ATAR. At St Leo's, we are working to include more of these courses in our suite of subject offerings. VET courses are competency-based and include work placement, the more applied approach to learning.

Students in 2023 have the option to select courses that they are truly interested in, courses with content that they really want to learn and that will make them want to come to school. For many years, the ATAR (previously the UAI and TER) was the holy grail of HSC study. The ranking number, which is not a qualification, is generated by marks attained in the HSC. It places students in NSW in a percentile band and allocates them a ranking for university entrance. The university entrance system is essentially a market where the more demand there is for a particular course the higher the ATAR needed to secure entry. Each HSC course contributes differently to the ATAR depending on the achievement levels of the cohort in that year and this has led to much myth-making and speculation around the concept of 'scaling'. The HSC has evolved



over the years, and we need to set aside outdated thinking about 'scaling' when assisting students selecting their courses for senior study. Yes, theoretically an HSC mark in one course may contribute more to an ATAR than the same mark in another course - but this assumes that individual students would achieve identical marks in different courses which, is definitely not the case.

All HSC courses are designed to require the same from students - the key variable is the students themselves. Therefore, student achievement in the HSC is strongly reliant on course selection. George Cooney and John De Courcy, experienced educators and researchers, explore these concepts in their paper 'Choosing Wisely, Choosing well' (<u>G.Cooney</u>, <u>J. De Courcy</u>, <u>2016</u>). They highlight the concept of choosing courses at an appropriate level of challenge so that students are able to take on the demands of the course without feeling either bored or overwhelmed.

All of this means that listening to teachers' advice about where students are up to with their learning is important. Our self-perceptions are not always accurate and can be based upon incorrect criteria. Knowledge and skills are developed over time and having a realistic idea of what how well a student will be able to take on the demands of a course within the two years of Preliminary HSC and HSC studies is a key component of making good Year 11 and 12 course choices.

In addition to this, senior study is about preparation for life after school and universities are using an everexpanding range of mechanisms to admit students into courses. In 2022, over 60% of St Leo's students were offered a university place prior to sitting the HSC. These offers are usually based upon a mixture of Year 11 marks, and community service and leadership contributions, so sustained effort and contributing to the community can be significant factors in achieving university entrance.

As educators at St Leo's, we want to do what we can to allow students to make good choices about how they will invest the final two years of their school lives. Senior study at school is an investment, an opportunity to build the knowledge and skills that will prepare young people to take the next steps in life. We know that the HSC

will teach them (in addition to the syllabus dot points) how to deal with pressure, manage their time, take on feedback, be persistent and resilient, and how to 'fail forward': learning from their mistakes and growing as learners and as people. An appropriate pattern of study will make this learning all the more successful.

Our subject selection process at St Leo's has been designed to engage students with these ideas and brings families into the process. Year 10 students and parents have been provided with information about the different courses on offer at St Leo's over the last few weeks. In the first round of course selection, students earlier this term made initial choices for a senior pattern of study. Not all the courses they selected will be able to run, neither will all combinations of courses work on the timetable. The second step of the process will be to counsel each student and their families on their selections based upon finalised information about which courses will run and how timetable lines will be distributed, so that each student can make the best choices from what is available. Information about how to book a Subject Selection Conference will be provided to families early in Term 3.

### Wellbeing for Learning Report

As we near the end of first semester, I am able to reflect upon some of the achievements in the area of wellbeing for learning, as well as identify common recurring themes among our young people.

#### **Pastoral Days and Camp**

It was clear from responses to the 2022 '*Tell Them From Me*' survey that a review our current pastoral care processes was needed due to the impact of COVID and our expanding year group sizes. In response, we decided to run 'Pastoral Days' for all students across Years 7-12 and create a dedicated time to address the wellbeing and pastoral care needs of students. These days have run successfully this semester, along with Year 12 participating in their retreat, Year 9 completing a four-day camp at Somerset and Year 7 their camp at beautiful Stanwell Tops, where they spent 3 days.

The aim and purpose of these events are to build a sense of belonging and community, and to strengthen relationships. Being off site and away from the classroom gives time and space for teachers to connect with and learn about their students, and to build essential relationships that will improve the efficacy of classroom practice.

#### **Bullying Response**

From surveying teachers who attended these Pastoral Days and camps, it is clear that connectedness and cohesion among year groups is improving. We have also been able to identify numerous themes that are affecting our young people across the board. Most commonly, bullying and online bullying are the most reported issues to Year Leaders and classroom teachers. As a result, the Wellbeing for Learning team will continue to provide education and assistance to students in this area.

Our whole-of-school approach to bullying includes, but is not limited to:

- College-wide CSBB anti-bullying policy
- classroom management and classroom rules
- the role of the teacher and their response to bullying
- positive relationships between teachers and students
- high levels of playground supervision
- promoting a culture of reporting bullying
- partnering with parents and carers
- social and emotional learning
- promoting 'upstander' behaviour.





#### **Students & Anxiety**

Anxiety is the most reported mental health condition being identified by young people and their parents/carers, The Pastoral Zone in Xavier Court has been created into 'Reset Room' (named by the students who use the room) to give those who suffer from anxiety-related disorders the time, space and privacy to manage their symptoms and get back into the classroom. Access to this space requires a medical diagnosis.

I would like to acknowledge the



support of the Pastoral Team in providing the utmost of care and compassion to all of our students who require this additional support. **Mrs Susan Raso** in Student Services, **Ms Kathleen Brinkmann** and **Ms Victoria Pirolo** who welcome our students to the Reset Room and continually update teaching staff and Year Leaders in regard to student wellbeing.




