
Principal's Message

Dear Parents/Carers,

A very busy conclusion to the end of a very productive Term Two.

Parent Feedback and the College Strategic Plan

Over the past two terms, the College has been working on the formation of the College Strategic Plan. This has been as a result of much consultation through data collection (state and localised sources, including parents/carers, students, staff and clergy), surveys, evaluations, interviews, classroom visits and much discussion and discernment, in light of CSBB's Towards 2025.



At the centre of our Strategic Plan is student achievement and learning. This is achieved through our two opportunities: Embedding high expectations for enabling success in learning for all, and Ensuring growth for all.

The purpose of the plan is to provide direction for our College and to bring to life Bishop Anthony's vision of providing an authentic, professional Catholic education delivered with care and compassion. The plan has been ratified by students (Student Leadership), staff and parents.

The work has not finished - in fact only just starting. From here, an Annual Plan for 2024 will be developed, containing target goals and key performance indicators. The process itself has just been as important as the outcome, and the work we are currently doing is certainly very much part of this Strategic Plan.

Thank you to all parents, students and staff who contributed to its formation, and it now gives me great pleasure to present the 2023-2026 College Strategic Plan.

Last Monday evening, 30 parents/carers participated in our *Parents in* Partnership Evening. Both Assistant Principals (Ms Carolina Murdoch and Mr Pat Brennan) presented an update of Term II, and our new Business Manager, Mr Rob Matthews was introduced and presented on his portfolio and upcoming developments around the College.

Parents were broken into small groups for discussion and each group provided feedback on these four questions that were linked to the

Year 7-10 Reports & Student Learning Conferences

As Year 7-10 parents would be aware, reports were released for Years 7-10 students yesterday afternoon. Following the release of the reports, the College is offering two dates for families to meet with teachers and discuss their young person's progress.

The dates for the Student Learning Conferences (or SLCs, previously known as Parent-Teacher Interviews) are:

- Thursday 20 July from 2pm to 6:30pm. This session will be an online session and families that book this session will be sent Zoom links prior to the evening.
- <u>Tuesday 25 July from 3:30pm to 7:30pm</u>. This session will be a <u>face-to-face session</u> at the College. Further information will be sent out prior to the evening.



Bookings for these meetings can be made via Compass, opening this afternoon (Thursday 29/6).

How to book your Student Learning Conferences:

All registered parents/carers will receive an <u>email notification from Compass</u> inviting them to nominate appointment times for Student Learning Conference interviews. The process is very simple, but please follow these steps if needed to access the 'Conferences' portal in Compass.

- 1. **Log into Compass** (if you need help with this, check the *Parent's Guide to Accessing the Compass Parent Portal*)
- 2. Once logged into Compass, a notification will appear under '**My News**' informing you that the Student Learning Conference interviews are now open to make appointments.
- 3. Select 'Click here for bookings' with this notification, which will take you to the bookings where your child's teachers' names will appear.
- 4. Select a teacher's name and an available time slot (in white) to book a time. Repeat for each teacher.
- 5. There is also a button 'Show me how to book' which will give you further instructions if needed.

Year 10 Students: Year 11 (2024) Subject Selections - Individual Student meetings

These meetings are scheduled for **Thursday 3 August** here at the College. The sessions will be approx. 20 minutes and bookings will be available between <u>3:30pm and 7pm</u>. A booking system on Compass will be open to families in <u>Week 1 of Term 3</u>.

Each student in Year 10 will have the opportunity to speak with a trained member of the College staff about:

- Expectations at St Leo's for students entering studies in Year 11
- Selected subjects and alternative pathways.

This is an extremely important meeting, and <u>all students and their families are</u> <u>expected to attend</u>. If you are not able to make this time, please contact the College and we will arrange an online appointment with you.



Year 8 Students: Year 9 (2024) Subject Selections

Students entering Year 9 in 2024 are given the opportunity to choose <u>two elective courses</u> they would like to study during Years 9 and 10. During Term 3, students in Year 8 will begin the process of selecting these subjects. Further information about dates will become available at the start of Term 3.

Year 12 HSC Holiday Classes

A reminder that over the break, a number of teachers will be running holiday classes for their Year 12 students. View the timetable of the sessions here.

Students attending these sessions are reminded that they are to <u>enter the College via the Woolcott Ave gate</u> (Gate A) only, as there will be maintenance work occurring around the College during the break.

NAPLAN Results Year 7 & 9

Students in Years 7 and 9 sat for their NAPLAN exams earlier this year. This was the first time that the entire state sat for these tests online. The results of these tests will be released in <u>late July</u>. The College will notify parents when we receive them at the College and also let you know how we will be sending them home.



As well as being the first time the entire state has sat these tests online there have also been updates to how the NAPLAN results are being reported. Linked <u>here</u> is an information sheet for parents about the new style of reporting for NAPLAN.

What's Been Happening?

Refugee Week

This week's school assembly was held on Wednesday to commemorate and raise awareness about Refugee Week, a global initiative that aims to celebrate the contributions of refugees to society and promote understanding and empathy towards their experiences. The assembly sought to educate students about the challenges faced by refugees, highlight their resilience, and encourage inclusivity within our school community.




