# **Assistant Principal Reports**

Last week Tuesday, April 2, teachers from across Catholic Schools Broken Bay (CSBB) gathered in The Light of Christ Centre to engage in a system-wide Professional Development Day. This was the first of two days that have been provided by CSBB as additional professional learning days for teachers. As one of CSBB's strategic goals for 'Towards 2025' (*below*), we are 'building the capacity of our staff'.

The day began with a NESA presentation from updating teachers on curriculum reform and reinforced **why** there is a specific focus on the areas below:

1. We will develop a collaborative culture of continuous improvement.

The presentation moved to unpacking the common grade scale (<u>LINK</u>) and how teachers are consistent with allocating grades to students across not only our CSBB schools, but the state.

The focus of the next Professional Development on April 29\_will be around quality assessment tasks and the image of the learner. Both of these worthy days align with our St Leo's Strategic Plan and how we can set our 'high expectations' and ensure 'growth for all'.

# **Gaming in the Library**

As you are aware, our library is an amazing thriving place where students flock to before, in breaks and after school to read, study and collaborate with peers. Unfortunately, there has been an increase in students using this space to play games on their devices.

All students have been informed that from the start of Term 2 there will be no electronic gaming permitted in this space, or anywhere on the school grounds.

Whilst we understand that for some students the library is a safe space, it is also important and necessary to have a break from devices. If found gaming they will be asked to switch off their device and if this is a continual occurrence, they will be asked to leave the library.

We are aware that gaming can be collaborative and a way for some students to socialise, so we are looking into the possibility of a co-curricular activity centred around this. *Watch this space!* 

# Parking around the College

We ask that all parents and carers are mindful of our neighbours with regards to parking by ensuring parking signs are respected and that driveways are not blocked.

# **Leaving Campus After 4pm**

Students attending after school activities on campus should note that the College Office closes at 4pm on school days, meaning Reception cannot open Gate A for students leaving. If students have after school activities finishing after 4pm, they should exit the campus/be picked up via Gate D (Unwin Road).

### **Year 10 Vaccinations**

NSW Health will be offering <u>vaccinations to all Year 10</u> <u>students on Monday 13 May 2024</u> here on campus for Meningococcal ACWY.

They will also be offering catch up vaccinations for:

- Year 11 Meningococcal ACWY (if not already vaccinated in Year 10)
- Year 8 dTpa and HPV (if not already vaccinated in Year 7)

Vaccination will only be provided at school if consent has been received. Please complete this consent at least 2 days prior to the school clinic.

How to provide consent:

1. To complete online consent for your child's school vaccinations, scan the QR (right) or visit: <a href="https://engage.health.nsw.gov.au/engage">https://engage.health.nsw.gov.au/engage</a> and log in using your ServiceNSW details. This is the same account you may already use to renew your driver's licence. Refer to Service NSW to create an account if you don't already have one.



- 2. Update or confirm your personal details in ServiceNSW as required.
- 3. Complete the School Vaccination Consent Form for your child. Read a step-by-step guide on how to provide consent online. If you require information in your language please visit Arabic, Korean, Simplified Chinese, Traditional Chinese, Vietnamese.

### PROCEDURE & POLICY REMINDERS:

### **Procedure for Students Leaving School Early**

From time-to-time, students are required to leave campus during the school day. To ensure a smooth, stress-free departure, parents and carers should remember the following:

- Parents and carers can add an absence note to Compass or send the child to school with a note regarding leaving early and the reason why.
- When the student needs to leave, they are to attend Student Services to sign out before leaving school.
- If the student arrives late or is returning after an appointment, they need to proceed to **Student Services to sign back in**.
- Whilst every attempt is made to remind a student that their parent or carer is waiting, this is not always
  possible with last minute classroom, teacher or venue changes. Students should be aware of when they are
  required to be collected from the front office and excuse themselves from class.

### Mobile Phones

A reminder that student mobile phones are to be stored in lockers, and preferably placed on silent or flight mode to eliminate loud ringtones. They can only be used next to one's locker before or after school for short periods of time. The only exception to this is when students are instructed to contact their parent/guardian regarding variations to scheduled events or, under direct teacher supervision, they may use their device.

<u>Devices cannot be taken to class</u> (every student has a laptop in class).

If a mobile phone is brought to any class or used during the day in the playground, a student will have their mobile phone confiscated until 3pm and issued with a demerit note on Compass.

Parents needing to contact their child during class time, should contact school reception directly.

### **Easter Liturgy**

This year our Easter Liturgy was celebrated in a more intimate way - in Mentor groups with 41 simultaneous events taking place on Holy Thursday.

Two students from each Mentor class volunteered to lead their groups and participated in three training sessions. The liturgy itself included lighting candles, readings from the Bible, prayers as they shared pita bread and juice, and sharings from everyone

on what has brought them joy this term as well as about an act of compassion they had witnessed. It was up to each Mentor group to decorate their room to provide an

appropriate atmosphere.

Following the liturgy, they had an opportunity for a Mentor celebration, bringing in food and drink to share.

Many thanks to the 82 students who led the prayers, the 82 students who did Bible readings and the Mentor teachers who supported their groups.



# **Upcoming Youth Ministry Opportunities**

Students at St Leo's have the opportunity to participate in voluntary retreat experiences to help them go deeper in their faith. Retreats are time away from school, work, family and friends to have some time for personal reflection and prayer while experiencing life in a small Christian community.

Two annual voluntary retreat opportunities are coming up:

From 16-18 May (Thursday afternoon to Saturday lunch), a small group of Year 10 students will have the opportunity to participate in the Venio Youth Ministry Retreat at the Josephite Centre for Spirituality at Kincumber. This is run by school-based Youth Ministry Coordinators and will involve staff and students from all eight Broken Bay high schools.

From <u>6-8 August</u> (Tuesday to Thursday), a group of Year 11 students will attend the <u>Abbey Retreat</u> at the Benedictine Abbey at Jamberoo. This is an experience unique to St Leo's where students spend time in quiet reflection and prayer with the nuns.







Students from Year 9 to 12 will also be invited to the <u>Shine Youth Ministry Conference</u> at St Peter's, Tuggerah, for worship and workshops. This year the special guest at Shine will be well known Australian spiritual singer/musician **Gen Bryant**, who performed at World Youth Day in front of over a million people.

At the start of next term, the Year 11 Vinnies Conference will also launch the <u>Vinnies Winter Sleepout</u> which will be on <u>14 June</u> and open to all students. Last year almost 100 students slept overnight at the Light of Christ Centre and raised over \$30,000 in

sponsorship to go to helping the good works of the St Vincent de Paul Society.

### Wellbeing Update

'On Wednesday, 3 April a group of Year 10-12 students accompanied by **Ms Cura**, **Mr Bowmer** and I attended Hornsby Hospital to take part in the Prevention of Alcohol and Risk Related Trauma in Youth program. The day consisted of workshops, simulations, and practical hands-on experiences. Students engaged in practical learning about the far reaching and long-lasting effects of choices that they may make when out with friends.'

### **RSL and Schools Remember ANZAC Commemoration**



Earlier last week, three of our senior students attended the RSL and Schools Remember ANZAC Commemoration held annually at the Anzac Memorial in Hyde Park.

This celebration aims to educate primary and secondary school students about Australia's military history, whilst paying respect to the service and sacrifice of servicemen and women of the Australian Defence Force.



The RSL and Schools Remember ANZAC Commemoration was first held in 1953, co-hosted by RSL NSW and the Department of Education. Over the years the service has expanded to Catholic Schools NSW and the Association of Independent Schools NSW.

Our students were chosen as three of the six flag orderlies for the ceremony. Flag orderlies are one of the most important roles in any commemoration. These six students are responsible for lowering the flags before the service to half mast, then during Act of Remembrance they raise the flags to full mast.



Year 11 Business Services students headed out this week for their first of two work placements that are a compulsory part of the Certificate III in Business Services course.








# Co-curricular Groups, Clubs & Activities Flourishing!

# Yr 11 and 12 Visual Arts Excursion to Art Express and Louise Bourgeois

Last week our senior Visual Arts students had the opportunity to view both Art Express and the Louise Bourgeois' exhibition 'Has



the Day Invaded the Night or Has the Night Invaded the Day?' at the NSW Art Gallery.

Art Express is an annual exhibition of exemplary artworks created by New South Wales visual arts students for the Higher School Certificate examination. It was an excellent opportunity for our students to see first hand the diverse range of mediums and themes explored by their peers as they embark on their own Body of Work major works for 2024.

In addition, Louise Bourgeois' exhibition explored a world of emotional extremes in an exhibition of one of the most influential artists of the past century. Giant metal spider sculptures and

alien-like forms greeted students as they explored 'The Tank', a repurposed multi-functional exhibition and performance space which was once used as an oil tank to provide fuel for the naval fleet at Garden Island in WWII.

Giving our students first hand experience of a variety of artworks and exhibition spaces helps to widen their understanding of material and conceptual practices.

# AROUND THE GROUNDS: CSBB Open Basketball


The Open Boys and Girls Basketball sides recently competed at the CSBB Championships at Breakers Stadium in Gosford.

### **Clean4Shore Excursion - 8 April**

We are pleased to share with you the exciting experience our students had at the recent Clean4Shore event on the Hawkesbury River.

The event began with a briefing from **David Bolton** of Hornsby Shire Council, who spoke about catchment management and water quality. This



was a great opportunity for our students to gain valuable insights into these crucial issues.

During the clean-up, our students discovered various items amidst the flood debris, including a plastic roadside barrier, advertising signage, timber pallets, plastic drums, and





buckets. Kangaroo Point had bulk timber debris, but plastic litter and flood debris were not as abundant. Uniform orders can be collected from the Turramurra store (by appointment – see Covid note below), posted (at cost) or delivered to St Leo's College Reception during school terms (at no additional charge).

### Secondhand Uniforms

- 1. The Uniform Exchange has a physical store in Pymble as well as an online store which buys and sells secondhand school uniforms. Buyers can search available items online by school. For sellers, there are no listing fees online, or they will sell items at their Pymble Exchange.
- 2. St Leo's is registered with sustainableschoolshop.com.au, an online trading platform for parents to buy and sell secondhand uniforms. The site also sells secondhand textbooks, musical instruments, calculators, etc.
  Buyers can search for items for free by school, set up a regular email alert for a 'stocktake report' of St Leo's uniform items currently listed, or place a 'wanted ad' after setting up a free account. Sellers can list items for \$1.50 (single items) up to \$21.95 for unlimited items (12 month subscription). Interested buyers than contact sellers directly (similar to Gumtree or Marketplace).

### Mobile Phone Policy

Mobile phones are ubiquitous in modern society and schools are in no way immune to the phenomenon. Across the world, in the media and among our lawmakers and academics, there has been ongoing debate about the impact of mobile phones being used by students during school hours. This discussion was reignited after the NSW Department of Education announced that mobiles will be banned for all students in NSW state primary and secondary schools in 2024.

While there are compelling reasons in favour of removing mobile phones from schools, there are also good reasons for being cautious about instigating such a sweeping ban. Unlike government schools who must abide by Department policy directives, as a Catholic systemic school, St Leo's can apply discretion in relation to this issue.

### Impacts in the Classroom

Arguably the key point raised in favour of banning mobile phones from schools, or at least from classrooms, is that they distract students and detrimentally affect learning, just as an open laptop can on occasions. St Leo's agrees with this argument and has therefore banned mobile phones in the classroom.

### Cyberbullying

Lowering the incidence of cyberbullying is another commonly cited reason for preventing students from using their phones during school hours. Current research suggests half of all young people have experienced cyberbullying via mobile phones. Child psychologist, **Dr Michael Carr-Gregg**, similarly points out that 'all schools have a legal obligation to provide a safe environment in which to learn' and that banning mobiles makes this easier to achieve.

However, it is worth noting that much of the cyberbullying experienced by young people does not occur during school hours or on school premises. In fact, part of what makes cyberbullying so dangerous is that it can occur anywhere and at any time. Clearly then, the problem will not suddenly come to an end by preventing students from using their phone at school. Furthermore, there is a risk that teachers may invest less effort in looking for signs of cyberbullying among students if there is an assumption that the ban will largely deal with the issue.

### What is the Policy at St Leo's?

The College recognises that most students possess mobile devices such as mobile phones, iPads, and Apple Watches. These devices are a useful way for family members to keep in touch. Though, this should not occur during the school day as it often causes anxiety amongst parents being contacted by their children for what most of the time can be described as 'minor' issues. The devices are often expensive, so securing them safely is a priority for all students. They also have the capacity to be a distraction in a school environment and so guidelines are required for their use.

### At the College

Devices are to be stored in lockers, and preferably placed on silent or flight mode to eliminate loud ringtones. They can only be used next to one's locker before or after school for short periods of time.

The only exception to this is when students are instructed to contact their parent/guardian regarding variations to scheduled events or, under direct teacher supervision, they may use their device.

Devices cannot be taken to class (every student has a laptop in class).

If a mobile phone is brought to any class or used during the day in the playground, a student will have their mobile phone confiscated until 3pm and issued with a demerit note on Compass.

Parents needing to contact their child during class time, should contact school reception directly.

Students found to have mobile devices switched 'on', using devices to 'hotspot' laptops to external data sources, bypassing the College's network, or used in anyway deemed inappropriate by College staff or supervising adult can expect their phone to be confiscated until 3pm and a demerit noted on Compass.

### At College Activities:

The College will determine the use of mobile phones during off-campus activities arranged by the College, including field trips, camps, and retreats.

The College takes no responsibility for a mobile device on its premises or excursions. Families are advised that the College expects that if students bring mobile devices to school or on excursions they do so with the full knowledge and authority of their parents. Parents are therefore advised to take appropriate measures to insure such mobile devices against loss, damage, or theft.

The College recognises that with many students travelling considerable distances to and from the College, with often irregular bus and train transport, it is important for the safety of the students that they have the capacity to contact their parents, or other family members in an emergency.

The College recognises that most devices have the ability to take photos or videos. Students are reminded that the law prohibits the use of devices for taking photos or videos of anyone without their permission and expressly forbids the use of cameras in change rooms and toilets.

As young people approach driving age it is important, they and their parents or carers are aware of what is ahead as a learner driver and how they achieve the 120 supervised driving hours in their logbook. As you may be aware, P-plate drivers are involved in more crashes than any other driving group (including learner drivers). Parents play a key role in guiding and promoting safe driving habits.
