Principal's Message

The Month of November

In the Catholic tradition, November is a time dedicated to remembering those who have passed away. This aligns with the conclusion of the Liturgical Year at the end of the month, with the new year beginning on the First Sunday of Advent – a four-week season of preparation for

Christmas.

During this month, the Church

encourages reflection on the end of earthly life and the hope of a passage to new life in God's presence. Throughout November, we honour the memory of those who have gone before us, praying and hoping for their eternal life in heaven.

We remember in our prayers all those in our community who have lost loved ones in these recent weeks – both students' and staff's families.

We invite all members of our community to visit the Chapel and write down the names of their departed loved ones. Prayers will be offered for these souls in our November Masses and prayer gatherings.



Last Monday at our morning assembly, I spoke to the students about Mark's Gospel reading from the previous Sunday. Jesus was asked which of the commandments was the most important. His reply highlighted two:

- 1. Love God, and
- 2. Love your neighbour as you love yourself.

If we could simply enact these two commandments 24/7, our world would be a far different – and better – place.

I reiterated that our St Leo's community is a school that seeks to be a safe and inclusive space for every student and staff member. There is no place for hate. We respect difference and different opinions. Each of us has the opportunity to build others up and leave the people and places we meet better from our presence and interactions.

I challenged our young people to strive to do the best they can in following these two 'greatest commandments'.

At St Leo's, we know that our young people who feel safe, connected and secure, and who have loving and trusting relationships, are more likely to be active participants in their learning. They are also more likely to achieve better physical, emotional, social and educational outcomes.

As a result, bullying is not tolerated and if it is occurring, and our young people don't know what to do, they should speak to their Year Leader or Mentor teacher in the first instance. Appropriate action *will* be taken.

Our Year 12 students have now finished their HSC Exams, with Physics on Thursday being the last exam. The Year 12 Formal is next Wednesday evening at Curzon Hall, Marsfield. We wish them all the best as they now head out to their many and varied ventures.



Stakeholders were invited to share their voice as we collectively reflected on the mission, growth, and future of the local Church in North Shore, Sydney. Dissemination of the data is currently taking place, and a summary will be presented to the Diocese in the coming weeks.

Year 7 Taronga Zoo Science Excursion



Taronga Zoo is always one of the favourite excursion destinations for our St Leo's students. There are so many varieties of animals they are excited to observe.


The visit linked in closely with the Stage 4 Science Syllabus. Students explored, through a scientific process, a variety of animals and learnt about the incredible range of natural behaviours and characteristics that help them survive in the wild.

Each of the seven Science classes generally went on a different experience as they travelled unique journeys within the Zoo. I was fortunate to accompany the Science E group, who managed to explore the elephants and the rainforest trail in the morning, enjoying views of monkeys, hippos and Binturong. They were able to view two scheduled activities - the Seal Show and the feeding of the Chimpanzees. One of the animals that seem to excite the students most was the friendly rivalry of the Gorillas, but the new Reptile and Conservation Centre also captivated them.

Students attended a workshop on classification and adaptations and had a guided tour through considerable parts of the zoo. There can be no doubt that the experienced presenters from the Education Centre are able to cleverly explain how our Australian wildlife have adapted to their environment. The students were able to touch some of the snakes, long-necked turtles and possums. They were also able to view green tree frogs, huntsman spiders and a variety of birdlife.



Other groups ventured into areas including watching the Bird Show, viewing Australian animals and animals of the African savannah areas. The students completed a







PARK LEGALLY IN SCHOOL ZONES AND KEEP OUR KIDS SAFE









DO NOT set-down/pick-up passengers.

Penalty exceeds \$387 and demerit points apply.









You **CAN** stop to set-down/pick-up passengers/goods within a 'No Parking' restriction for:

- · A maximum stay of 2 minutes and
- · The driver must stay within 3 metres of the vehicle

Holders of a Mobility Parking Scheme permit are able to stay for 5 minutes.

Penalty exceeds \$214 and demerit points apply.



STOPPING OR PARKING IS NOT PERMITTED ON OR WITHIN

- · 20 meters before or
- 10 meters after a pedestrian crossing

Penalty exceeds \$514 and demerit points apply.







STOPPING OR PARKING IS NOT PERMITTED

within the direction of the arrows at any time or during the time indicated unless you are driving a bus.

Penalty exceeds \$387 and demerit points apply.



A driver must **NOT STOP** on the road adjacent to another vehicle at any time.

Passengers should not leave a vehicle that is double parked. Drop your child and passengers to the kerb only.

Penalty exceeds \$387 and demerit points apply.



SCHOOL ZONE SAFETY TIPS

KEEPING YOUR CHILDREN SAFE WHEN
DROPPING OFF AND PICKING UP AT SCHOOL

DOUBLE PARKING IS DANGEROUS



School zones are busy at peak times. If there is no space to park legally, drive to a new location or around the block.

DON'T PARK ACROSS PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS



In queued traffic, don't stop your vehicle across a pedestrian crossing.

STOP, LOOK, LISTEN AND THINK



Walking is a great way to get between home and school. When walking, remember to stop, look, listen and think, even when you have right of way.

EXIT THE CAR SAFELY



The 'safety door' is the door that opens onto the kerb side. This is the best side for children to use when entering/ exiting the vehicle.

DROP-OFF AND PICK-UP



When using a 'No Parking' student drop-off and pickup zone ("kiss and drop"), you have two minutes to set down or pick up passengers. Please remain within 3 metres of your vehicle.

AVOID MAKING U-TURNS AND THREE-POINT-TURNS



U-Turns and threepoint-turns increase the risk of a serious crash in school zones, especially when turning over centre lines or near crossings.

WEAR YOUR SEATBELT



When driving, ensure children are buckled up in the correct restraint for their size and age. Wait for the vehicle to stop and park before taking off restraints.

FAMILIARISE YOURSELF WITH PROCEDURES



Each school has its own student travel procedures designed to keep families safe. Work with your school to understand drop-off and pick-up procedures.



SCHOOL ZONE OFFENCES

WHAT ARE YOU RISKING?*

FACT

Children are small, harder to see, behave unpredictably and are extremly vulnerable. They need you to take extra care when driving and parking around school zones.

NO PARKING

You have two minutes to drop-off or pick-up passengers and must stay within three metres of your vehicle.





NO STOPPING

You must not stop on a length of road to which a 'No Stopping' sign applies (unless otherwise signposted).

Yellow edge kerb lines are also used to indicate no stopping zones.

Drivers must not stop or park within 10 metres of an intersection without traffic lights and 20 metres of an intersection with traffic lights (unless otherwise signposted).





BUS ZONE

Only a bus can stop within a bus zone or at a bus stop.

You must not park within 20 metres before and 10 metres after a bus stop unless a sign says you can.





MOBILE PHONES

Extra fines apply for using a mobile phone in a school zone.





SPEED LIMIT

Within school zones and during school zone times, the speed limit is reduced to 40km/h.

PENALTY EXCEEDS \$200 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS



DRIVEWAYS, FOOTPATHS AND NATURE STRIPS

Do not park on, across or block access to driveways, footpaths, pedestrian ramps or on the nature strip area.

This can obstruct property access, damage assets and increase risk to pedestrians.





PEDESTRIAN CROSSING

In queued traffic, do not stop your vehicle on a pedestrian or children's crossing. Wait on the approach side of the crossing until there is space on the departure side to continue with the traffic queue.

Do not drop off or pick up passengers on a crossing.

PENALTY EXCEEDS \$481 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS

U TURNS AND THREE-POINT TURNS

U-turns and threepoint-turns are illegal on or near a pedestrian crossing and across a single or double white unbroken lines.

PENALTY EXCEEDS \$344 + 3 DEMERIT POINTS

DOUBLE PARKING

Double parking is illegal and is very dangerous in a school zone.

PENALTY EXCEEDS \$362 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS
