


Principal's Final Report for 2024

Yesterday over morning tea, we had over 40 of our Year 12 (2024) young people gather and reconnect with their teachers in our staff room to share and celebrate the HSC results they received just a few hours earlier. We were very proud and pleased for the 2024 cohort and their families with their HSC results.



There were some outstanding and even stateleading results this year. Over 86% of those Year 12 students eligible for an ATAR received early entry to a wide variety of university courses prior to the HSC. Some of these students received multiple university offers.

For a comprehensive secondary school, accepting and working with all students to be the best people that they can be – we, the St Leo's staff, as you their parents, are very happy and wholeheartedly congratulate this 2024 Year 12 cohort.

We acknowledge both the group effort and the many individual personal bests in not only the HSC, but as they move from adolescents into

young people of conscience who will make a positive difference in our world in whatever they move into in their Year 13 and beyond!

The **St Leo's Mathematics Competition** was a remarkable 5-month mathematical journey where a number of Year 7 and 8 students embarked on investigations into topics that sparked their interest. Throughout this journey, participants showcased their passion, curiosity, and deep exploration into their chosen mathematical areas.

Judged through three exciting showcases with our guest judges, **Miss Stephanie Lam** and **Mr Adam Barton**, students demonstrated not only their knowledge, but also their enthusiasm for discovery and problem-solving.

Years 8 and 9 Talk Money

We were thrilled to welcome **Talk Money** into our school recently, where they engaged all Year 8 and Year 9 mathematics classes in their dynamic financial literacy Workshops A and B.

These workshops focused on equipping students with essential skills to make informed financial decisions in their everyday lives. From understanding the importance



of budgeting and saving to learning about responsible spending, our students had the opportunity to connect classroom maths to real-world financial situations in an interactive way.

Maths in Action

After their Yearly Exams, our Year 7-9 students embarked on exciting projects under the theme *Maths in Action*, each year level tackling a unique challenge. The culmination of their hard work was a judging session where the top teams presented their projects to a panel of esteemed judges.

For our Year 7s, *Maths in Action: Entrepreneurial Ventures* invited students to apply their understanding of data collection, display, analysis, and probability to create a business plan answering the question, 'What is a product or service that makes the world a better place?' This encouraged creativity and practical application of maths



concepts in a real-world entrepreneurial setting.

Year 8 students, in *Maths in Action: Investigating Science*, worked on analysing existing data collected by Year 11 Investigating Science students. They used their maths skills to delve into scientific data, understanding trends and making insightful observations that connected the disciplines of maths and science in an investigative context.

Year 9 students took part in *Maths in Action: Principal's Problem -- School Waste Audit*, supported by the Environmental Club. Rubbish was collected by and from the rest of the school, which Year 9 students sorted, weighed, and categorised into various sub-categories. They then analysed this large amount of data using technology, identifying potential problems and making well-reasoned suggestions to improve waste management across the school.

Latest BYODD Specifications for 2025

parents of Year 8-9 students to buy new devices at this point. This is to let you

know the current specifications so that **if you need to replace a student device**, you are aware of the latest requirements and choices.

For students in Years 10-11, we do highly recommend moving from an iPad to laptop for senior studies as in previous years, and you now have the option or either a PC/Windows-based or Apple OS device.



From the start of this year, we began phasing out iPads from Year 7, as well as giving all families the option of either a PC/Windows-based or Apple OS device for all classes.

The College, through CSBB's Digital Enablement team, will continue to support all student devices and have developed the following specifications and recommendations for purchasing your device to ensure it can be used for three years of class work, as per industry standards.


