On Thursday I had the pleasure of joining eight other staff at the *Year 10 Celebration Dinner* at The Epping Club. Just over 145




Advent Wishes

As the year draws to a close, the changes that have occurred in teaching and learning are overwhelming, not only at St Leo's but across the state.

For secondary teachers, the NSW Curriculum Reform has led to an exciting time of preparation, planning and implementation of our new Syllabuses. The reform ensures there is a clear focus on essential content, that every

student has the opportunity and is entitled to learn, and that there is a clear articulation of what students are expected to know, understand and be able to do. It explicitly states the knowledge and skills to be learnt.

We have a busy couple of years ahead as teachers focus not only on what students learn, but on how they learn and the transferrable knowledge and skills across multiple areas of the curriculum. It is an exciting challenge that we as educators, as **Dr Simon Breakspear** (educational leader and researcher) frames it, 'get to do' rather than what we have to do.



The other major development in this space at St Leo's was the launch of our *Teaching and Learning Framework*. Students are becoming familiar with the language of '*Learning @St Leo's*'. We have, and will continue, to work with them to ensure they leave our college being *Responsible, Resilient, Independent* and *Collaborative* learners – all attributes Leo's teachers believe are essential for successful learners.

This week in morning briefing, we prayed for our teachers. I thought it important to put in the last Lion Roars for all of us to reflect on the amazing efforts they put in every day.

'Almighty God, we come to you today and give thanks for all our teachers. Thank you for the way in which they give of themselves each day in the classroom, serving and instructing the next generation of this land. We thank you for them all now. God, please fill their hearts with courage now by your mighty Spirit. Fill them with your strength, so they may rise to every challenge and not grow weary. 'In Hope of Finding Humility in Mudgee'

'Word nerds like me remember that the Latin word 'humus' means ground or soil or dirt. Closely related, the word 'humble' is related to not feeling 'above the ground' and better than everybody else. The word 'humiliate' is related to bringing others down and making them feel like dirt.



When my daughter rang from Melbourne asking why we so quickly decided to move to Mudgee, my husband had a beautiful answer. He didn't say, 'for a simpler life', because in so many ways it is going to be so complicated. (We don't know many people, we have never had animals except a dog and ants in the kitchen, it is three and a half hours away from Sydney family and friends). He didn't say, 'for a slower life' because we will be playing catch up and moving quickly to build community and Bathurst Diocese curriculum. I love that he said, 'Soph, darl... we want a more *GROUNDED* life: A life that humbles us... that might make us rely not just on our own knowledge, strength and relationships but on a Loving Life Force: God. The God I so often dismiss or forget in our current life.'

I say farewell to St Leo's which in many ways has also given me opportunities to be humble: to teach subjects which quickly grounded me, to travel to places that inspire awe, to befriend colleagues from whom I have learnt so much and to be with teenagers who remind me of how much I still have to learn.'

Lost Property - Last Call!


We have a mountain of unlabelled uniform and other lost property which has been unclaimed for many months, including from camps.

The Lifeline Managing Your Mood Group has been specifically designed for adolescents (aged 14-18) to learn and develop a range of psychological skills and techniques in a safe, group environment to better manage their mood. It is suitable for those who experience emotions strongly and want to change unhelpful behaviour patterns by learning new skills. Conveniently located near public transport, this DBT-informed psychological skills group is held face-to-face weekly for two hours and is at no cost (with a GP referral and a Mental Health Treatment Plan).

If you can't find what you are looking for on the ePlatform, try your local library or The State Library. There may even be some gems on your home bookshelf.




The Hobbit - Tolkien




Lawn Bowls Champions!
